Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

"I forgive you."

That simple sentence is powerful. It makes a dynamic impact on both the one hearing it and the one speaking it. The usual replies to an apology following along the lines of, "That's okay," or "Don't worry about it." These replies dismiss the apology, as well as the precipitating offense, as insignificant. These replies do not heal the wound created by the offense; they allow it to fester under the surface.

In contrast, "I forgive you," recognizes the offending action as hurtful, whether intended as such, or not. It hears the confession of the offender as true repentance in need of absolution. "I forgive you," offers that absolution, clearly removing all condemnation, and fully restoring the relationship between the two individuals.

The fact that apologies are so readily dismissed may be an indicator of how insincere they have become – the one apologizing says it automatically as a matter of good manners, neither genuinely acknowledging the commission of an offense in need of forgiveness, nor expecting absolution.

Unfortunately, this automatic and frequent occurrence of insincere apologies and dismissive responses has lead to real challenges in our interactions when a genuine apology for offensive action is called for, and absolute absolution is necessary. In these cases, the offender still knows how to apologize, and does so from the heart; but since, "I forgive you," is so foreign to our conversation, the responder is left with nothing other than, "It really is okay." To actually say, "I forgive you," would agree that the behavior was hurtful, and we seem to think that acknowledging the hurt somehow aggravates the conflict.

# Or perhaps our reluctance to say, "I forgive you," is even more sinister. "I forgive you," would remove all condemnation, offer the absolution sought by the offender, and, most importantly, restore the damaged relationship. Perhaps that's why, "I forgive you," has become a rarity – we are unwilling to let go of the offense. To say, "I forgive you," takes all the wind out of the sail that holds the offender hostage to our hurt. It prevents us from returning to the offense as leverage. It removes the opportunity to feel superior.

In order to restore, "I forgive you," to our conversation, we need to remember how readily and sincerely God says it to us. In Christ's death on the cross God has exacted all the condemnation, punishment, and wrath, for all of our offenses (and they are many for each one of us). God no longer has any 'bone to pick' with us for anything we've done. He can't hold it over our heads because He has forgiven us – completely, without reservation. He remembers our sin no more.



# Stewardship – The Exalted State of Servant Hood

Martin Luther, the author of the Reformation, which we celebrate the end of October, wrote, "A Christian is a perfectly free lord of all, subject to none. A Christian is a perfectly dutiful servant of all, subject to all." Perhaps those two sentences appear at first to be contradictory. What Luther was trying to help us understand is that we, as Christians, are called to freedom from an obligation to serve, but that we are called to the freedom to serve joyfully.

This call to joyful servant hood is understood and often scoffed at, simply because we have confused servant hood with servitude. Servitude conveys the idea of bondage and even slavery. Servant hood, on the other hand, connotes voluntary service, joyful giving of ourselves, a willing choice to help others, and selfless commitment.

One who is involved in servitude, serves unwillingly out of a sense of fear and has no hope of entering into a different state, while one involved in servant hood lives in an exalted state, a healthy and uplifting climate of helping others. Even though challenges must be overcome and problems may abound, the joy of servant hood is the overriding experience.

How do we get from a state of servitude to a state of servant hood? This transition is made when we properly understand the Word of God which clearly defines servant hood by explaining Christ's purpose in coming to Earth: "... *the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give His life as a ransom for many*" (Matthew 20:28). Jesus has lived the perfect life of the servant in our places, so we no longer are constrained to try to "measure up" to what God expects. The Law never saves, never enables us, only shows us our shortcomings.

When we look at Christ, though, and how He lived His earthly life and what He has done for us, we are freed to respond with heartfelt, sincere, loving service to those He has placed around us. The acts of service we render are the same; the motivation and attitude are what make the difference. Through Christ, we are elevated to the exalted state of servant hood.
