Perhaps, most significantly, the impact will be seen in the residual impact a year of isolation has had on our psyche. God has created us to be in relationship – with him and with each other. It is the reason he established the family unit, an automatic, built-in support group. It is the reason he established the church – to continue to develop our relationship with him. During these times of isolation, our relationships have taken a huge hit. But because the impact cannot be measured in dollars and cents, or by test scores or graduation rates, it will be easy to dismiss this damage and fail to focus on rebuilding our relationships with the same intensity we will employ in business and education. This would be a disastrous mistake.

God's desire and design for relationships is in our physical and spiritual DNA. We can ignore it, avoid it, and even deny it; but we cannot change it. And no amount of forced isolation will change it, either. Instead, we should, with more energy than ever before, and as soon as it is safe and wise to do so, be very intentional about restoring and even developing new relationships with family members and friends. But even more essential is reaching out to those we don't know, and being receptive to such overtures toward us by others.

- Keep a record of the members present at all meetings and determine whether or not a quorum is present for the transaction of legal business.

### Financial Secretary—Bill Steele

- Receive and count all congregational moneys and deposit them in the bank.
- Keep a confidential record of all contributions from members and provide them with periodic statements.
- Keep an accurate record of all transactions and prepare reports for each regular meeting of the Board of Directors and the congregation.
- Prepare the annual financial plan.

- Keep and maintain accurate records of all congregational receipts and disbursements.
- Make timely payments of all authorized expenditures.
