Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Following 9-11 we became accustomed to a new normal in traveling: security screening lines are longer and move more slowly (and we remove our shoes) and our carry-on luggage is more highly regulated and thoroughly checked, just to name two obvious changes. We recognized early on that these changes were not temporary and we have accepted them as necessary, even though they are frustrating.

When we first encountered the pandemic, we anticipated a finite period of time during which we would make adjustments to our practices. We expected that after perhaps a year, at most, things would return to the way they were. I don't think anybody expected that a 'new normal' would develop. The vaccine would be a safe, sure-fire preventive measure, and we would resume life as usual. In the meantime, we would take temporary measures, make short-term adjustments to our behavior, and, perhaps most significantly, we suspended some activities until this passed.

That was more than 1½ years ago. The charts of new cases, hospitalizations, and deaths look like a thrilling roller coaster ride at the most extreme amusement park. Far from an end being in sight, some are now hypothesizing that coronavirus will simply be an ongoing battle, just as the flu is, with annual vaccines targeting the latest variant.

Regardless of what the future holds regarding this virus, it is becoming apparent that unlike our anticipated return to the normal of pre-Covid, we are more likely going to develop new normals in response to the ongoing threat, just as we developed a new normal after 9-11. Our challenge, as the church, is to modify or create new programs that accomplish our mission and ministry while recognizing and minimizing that threat.

We can no longer simply put programs on hold until this passes. We cannot write off the blessings of some activities simply because the way we did them in the past is no longer safe. We need to be as creative in finding long-term solutions to effective ministry as the TSA was in finding ways to keep us safe while traveling.

We can begin by asking, "What do we value the most?" "What activities need to be retooled in order to retain them as part of our congregational life?" Worship, of course, is first; and we have done a remarkable job of emergency, and then enduring, modifications so that our worship is available to everyone. Likewise, we have adapted our Bible studies to a Zoom format to make them available; and we will continue to look at the possibility of making them hybrid, that is, simultaneously in-person and Zoom.

But we must not stop there. Historically, we have thoroughly enjoyed a variety of fellowship opportunities: Dining with Friends, Sunday morning refreshment & fellowship time, and potluck dinners. For years before the pandemic, we had been saying we needed to have more dinners. In the last year and a half we have had none. Our two recent luncheons following memorial services confirmed our desire to gather around food, yet left us looking for a safer methodology. In fact, the most recent one found us eating outside as well as inside.

Stewardship

Our Thursday night ladies Bible study just finished the Book of Deuteronomy and in the back of the book they included a Hymn: *Take my life, and let it Be*; which is a great Stewardship Hymn. Verse one is: "*Take my life and let it be consecrated Lord to Thee; take my hands and let them move at the impulse of Thy love.*" It has 3 more verses but I think you get the Idea.

Our last Stewardship event was the BBQ fund raiser and these are the results - Socks 493; Shoes 78 pairs; and a check for 3,246.02. A big thank you goes out to each and everyone that helped in anyway.

Our next Stewardship event will be Stewardship Sunday on October 24th. We will focus on Time and Talents and in the past we have handed out sheets with a list of different areas that you could volunteer for. This year will be different in format. With elections coming up in December for council positions we will be highlighting these plus asking for help in various ways to make these positions less work for just one person. If you have never held one of the offices do not let that stop you from volunteering---If God directs you to an office he will guide you. These are the offices we need people for: Financial secretary (and helpers); Recording secretary (take notes at council meetings and type them up); Evangelism (committee members); Head Elder; and Christian Ed. If you have any Questions about these positions please feel free to ask about them. Ron Hajduk our president will be happy to help you.

Pastor's Extracurricular, Ancillary Activities

I chose both words to describe these activities for specific reasons: Extracurricular means activities that are not usually associated with the office of Pastor. Ancillary describes those activities which are necessary to the function of the office of Pastor.

A pastor engages in many activities that are extracurricular, but not ancillary. That is, they are ordinarily not essential to the office of Pastor. Community activities of all sorts are the easiest example. This is not to say that a pastor should not be involved in the community. Rather, these are often thought of as superfluous to his office. One could reasonably argue (I would disagree) that the absence of such activities is not detrimental to the essential functioning of the office.

Ancillary activities, on the other hand, are those which are essential to the functioning of the office of Pastor as we understand that office in the Lutheran Church – Missouri Synod.

Following are updates on my involvement in two such extracurricular, ancillary activities:

Vacancy Pastor at Risen Christ – This is considered ancillary because maintaining a presence in the pastoral office of the congregation is essential to a healthy congregation. This necessity makes it incumbent on every pastor to participate, as they are able, when a neighboring church is vacant. The church at large benefits from every congregation remaining healthy. Unhealthy churches can negatively impact other congregations, especially those nearby. For that reason, every congregation has a vested interest in helping other, local congregations remain healthy.

Early this year, after discussion with our Elders, I joined Pastors Hollar and Kuppler in a Vacancy Covenant with Risen Christ to serve them until such time as they installed a new pastor. This covenant included a provision for regular evaluation and adjustment as the situation dictated.

Risen Christ has responded very well to the dedicated work of Pastor Hollar. They are rebounding with grace and strength from the challenges of the last several years. In evaluating the Vacancy Covenant, in light of this growth, all parties agreed that Pastor's Hollar and Kuppler, along with assistance from newly retired Pastor Steve Vogt, would be able to handle all the responsibilities associated with the vacancy. Therefore, I have been released from my participation in the Vacancy Covenant.

Circuit Visitor (CV) – The pastor in this office serves as the District representative in the local circuit. He is involved in:

The call process when a congregation calls a pastor,

Assisting the establishment of new congregation,

Facilitating the closing of a congregation

Providing guidance when disputes arise within a congregation or between congregations, just to name a few of his responsibilities.

Looking at the list of responsibilities, one can understand why this office, also, is essential to the pastoral office.

In March 2017, I began serving as Assistant Circuit Visitor. In November 2018, after consultation with our Elders, I accepted the appointment by President Denninger to be Circuit Visitor, when the then-CV needed to resign the position due to increasing responsibilities at his secular iob.

This Saturday, Oct. 2, our circuit will hold its Circuit Forum in preparation for the District Convention next year. Ron Hajduk is our lay delegate. One of the agenda items is electing the CV for a 3-year term which will begin at next year's convention in May. I am happy to report that I expect that 3 names will be nominated, including mine. Even if another pastor is elected to the CV position, I will serve in the office until May. That means I will be involved in the call process at Risen Christ. Our Assistant Circuit Visitor is facilitating the call process at Calvary, Charleston. His service there will also continue until May.

These ancillary activities are absolutely essential to the conduct of the church at large. They are best accomplished when a variety of pastors share the responsibilities, as has been the practice across our circuit for as long as I have been here.

While they do require a time commitment by the pastor holding those offices, every individual congregation benefits from a well-functioning synod, district, and circuit. It is worth noting that during my first 11 years at Holy Lamb, I did not serve in either of these positions. That means that Holy Lamb was benefitting from another congregation's willingness to allow their pastor to serve.

At this time, I have served in the circuit longer than all but one of our active pastors, so it is appropriate that I took my turn. I thank our members for allowing me to serve our district and circuit.

Since most of them are not yet vaccinated, this was an unacceptable risk. Many of the activities and opportunities of the Fall Festival also involved close personal encounters, such as face painting. Given the high transmission ability of the delta variant, this, too, was not an acceptable risk.

Men's Christian Fellowship




